Third Haven Friends Meeting Meeting for Business Minutes for the 12th Month, 9, 2012

1. Candace Shattuck, Clerk of Meeting, after a brief period of silence, gathered the meeting for worship with attention to business at 11:35AM.
2. 3. Minutes: The Meeting approved the minutes of meeting for business 11th Month.
4. Query: The 12th Query on "Integrity and Simplicity" was read during meeting for worship. In order to make sense of the combination of these two important values, one Friend commented "living a life of Integrity makes life simpler".

6. Worship & Ministry Committee Annual Report: (below) Meeting approved this report with many thanks for this dynamic committee's activities through the year. In addition to the below report, the committee discussed several issues. The Christmas service this year will be held on Christmas Eve, December 24th at 4PM. It will be a half-hour service. The committee has discussed the arrangement of benches and the need for carpet in the Brick Meeting House. W&M feels that the bench arrangement at this time is a good one, reflecting equality among attenders and the ability for people to see each other's faces more easily. The issue of carpets has been discussed often. Although the acoustics in the Brick Meeting House are not quite as clear without rugs or carpets, the newly refurbished floors are quite beautiful and the air is much cleaner. There is a sense of general unity that the floors should not be covered at this time. Property & Grounds committee will be discussing the attributes of acoustical ceiling paints and /or experimenting with area rugs in the future so that an open mind can be kept in the future for changes to these arrangements.

7. Nomination Committee Final Report: With only minor revisions, the committee's report was approved by the Meeting. This entire report has been posted on the website and includes the revisions made during this meeting for business. This committee worked very hard over the past several months and did an excellent job. The committee was thanked by Meeting. The Clerk of Meeting will be appointing the last member of the committee in the near future. (see report below)

8. Testimonies & Concerns Annual Report: The complete report below was approved by the Meeting with thanks for all the social concerns work this committee does. We particularly enjoyed that the report format was structured as queries making the work of this committee even more thoughtful. The committee also reported on the list of recommendations for THFM annual contributions. Their recommendation was to give the following charities \$125 each: AFSC, FCNL, Friends Journal, Pendle Hill, Quaker EarthCare Witness, Neighborhood Service Center, TACL (Good Samaritan), TIS, PEACE, Migrant Ministries, and Habitat for Humanity. As we discussed this list, some Friends felt that a bigger proportion of money should be allocated to our Quaker organizations that have been struggling this past year. The list below was sent back to committee to work on a bit more and then present to Meeting at a future meeting for business. The committee also reported on the contributions from the Shoffner International Fund. The charities were picked by T&C along with First Day School. The \$1,000 donated this year included \$500 from the Shoffner fund and \$500 from a private source. Two hundred dollars

5. Overseers Committee Report: Norval Thompson, Doreen Getsinger and Larissa Kitenko met with Catherine Cripps this past month as the clearness committee for requested membership to THFM. Catherine grew up in Easton but lived for some time in Texas. She has a master's degree in psychology and actively practices in her home office. She has been participating in First Day School for some time now. The committee enjoyed their meeting with Catherine and wholeheartedly recommends her for membership. A welcoming committee composed of John Schreiner (convener), Candace

each was donated to AfriCare, Doctors Without Borders, The Clinton Initiative, World Vision, and Heifer International. The children were careful in choosing these foundations and wanted to cover the issues of food, education and safety. A Friend suggested that T&C write a blurb about each charity in the newsletter so we can all learn what they do.

9. Discussion on Incorporation and Insurance Status: Below is the full explanation regarding our corporate structure and the way our insurance coverage is handled. The need to clarify this structure came about after some questions were raised regarding how to handle donations of stocks to the Meeting. In brief summary, the Trustees hold the deed to the property and grounds. The Trustees are incorporated separately from THFM as a nonprofit with their own bylaws. THFM is legally incorporated as a subordinate of PYM. The Trustees pay insurance premiums to protect the property and grounds and the Meeting from liability. The Treasurer keeps the full details of these structures. This report was approved.

10. Effect of the passage of Maryland Civil Marriage Protection Act: The effect of the passage of Maryland's Question 6 on THFM's minutes regarding same sex unions was raised at last month's meeting for business. The issue was brought forward to this month's meeting for a more complete review of our actions to date and further discussion. In brief summary, our history follows that in 2005, after lengthy deliberations, our Meeting approved the "Paul minute" allowing recognition of same-sex spiritual unions by those in the Meeting who chose to support said unions. In 2009, after the subject was raised again in the context of the query on equality, a minute was approved bringing same-gender spiritual unions under the care of the Meeting. Both complete minutes are included below. A thoughtful discussion then took place with many Friends weighing in on what this issue meant to them. Many said that Quakers should be proud of the stand we have been willing to take on important social justice issues and we should continue to stand firm in our support of individual rights and freedoms. A Friend said he would personally be unable to sign a marriage document for same gender unions under the care of the Meeting but many others shared their support of same gender marriages. There was much support for consideration to revise our 2009 minute on Same Sex Union to include the broader language of marriage and to show our support of ceremonies as true marriages. Dee Rein, Doreen Getsinger and Mary Cotton volunteered to work on a revision of our 2009 minute and bring this to our next meeting for business.

11. New Business: The Treasurer reported that the caretaker's health insurance has been paid. The amount paid for insurance this year will be less than budgeted due to the fact the coverage was begun later in the year. One Friend expressed concern regarding the writing from the Quaker Institute for Future entitled "Earth Care Economics" and desires a group to work on a broader response to this topic from THFM. The Clerk requested that those interested in this please talk to Rob Wieland and this group can meet with T&C at their next committee meeting to discuss this further.

Meeting for business was adjourned at 1:25PM

Third Haven Friends Meeting Worship and Ministry Committee 2012 Annual Report

Purpose

The purpose of the Worship and Ministry Committee was approved at the 10.3.11 meeting for business. The (abbreviated) purpose is:

Meeting for Worship: The Worship and Ministry Committee cares for the meeting for worship.

Spiritual Nurture: The Committee nurtures and supports the Spiritual life of the meeting, and the Spiritual journeys members and attenders.

Adult Religious Education: The Worship and Ministry Committee provides opportunities for the Meeting community to learn about our Faith and Practice, the Religious Society of Friends, and Quaker and other Spiritual practices. The Committee offers and supports teaching and learning opportunities to support the meeting for worship, and the Spiritual journeys of members and attenders.

Worship and Ministry Committee

The members of the Worship and Ministry Committee (WMC) for 2012 are – Luisa Adelfio, Mark Beck, Gwen Beegle, Tom Corl, Connie Lewis, Katherine Johnson, Mike Pullen, Rob Wieland and John Winterbottom. Tom Corl clerked the Committee. The WMC met monthly except for 6th and 8th months. Meetings opened and closed with silent worship. Meetings often began with a reading and discussion. Members attended Committee meetings regularly and actively supported many WMC activities.

Meeting for Worship

The WMC provides greeters before the meeting for worship to welcome members, attenders and visitors. Greeters offer various pamphlets and brochures to visitors and those new to the Third Haven and the Quaker meeting for worship. Members of the WMC read the 12 Queries on the First Day of meeting for business, and the 4 Advices in meeting for worship during the year. The attendance at meeting for worship varies from week to week and month to month. Based on regular counts by Robert Shattuck, attendance averages around 75-85, including children who go out for First Day School. The number of children varies a great deal. In the summer months, attendance is often less, around 50 some First Days. In 2012, meeting for worship occasionally had attendance of around 100. The 4th Day meeting for worship usually attracts 4-5. The Meeting is growing in attendance at meeting for worship. The meeting for worship is vital and meaningful for members, attenders and visitors.

All the members of the WMC attend the meeting for worship as regularly as possible, listen, experience and appreciate the meeting for worship, silence and vocal ministry. The WMC considers and discusses the meeting for worship and vocal ministry at each WMC meeting. When the meeting for worship is not gathered or when the vocal ministry seems inappropriate, the Committee discerns the matter very carefully and makes appropriate response.

The WMC finds the Third Haven meeting for worship consistently spiritual, rich and nourishing. The Meeting attracts many visitors each year. Membership continues to grow. Newcomers frequently acknowledge the value and importance of the meeting for worship in attracting them and leading them into participation in Third Haven Friends Meeting. The Third Haven meeting for worship and participation in it are blessings, appreciated by members, attenders and visitors. The Third Haven meeting for worship is a great gift from each of us to all of us. The Committee seeks to nurture and sustain this blessed meeting for worship.

Worship and Ministry Activities

The WMC offered a variety of adult religious education opportunities and activities in 2012:
Essence of Faith and Practice

The WMC organized and offered 4 sessions at the rise of meeting for worship based on the "Essence of our Faith and Practice," approved by the meeting for business on 4.11.10. Tom Corl planned and organized the 4 sessions: That of God – Tom Corl, about 25 attended;

 Silent Worship – Luisa Adelfio and Tom Corl, 8 attended;

 Testimonies – Gwen Beegle, Cynthia Browne and Lorraine B Claggett, 14 attended; and

 Community – Candace Shattuck and Dee Rein, 18 attended.

Though attendance was uneven, the presentations were very thoughtful and well done. The participants were engaged, the sessions most useful and participants grateful. The Committee may plan and offer like sessions in 2013.

Meditation Sessions

Mark Beck facilitated and led 4 meditations sessions at 5:00 pm on 6th day (Friday) every two weeks beginning on 9.21. Sessions lasted an 90 minutes each. These were open to the wider local community:

 Introduction and overview to meditation practice – Mark Beck

 Jewish and Muslim Meditation Practice – Bob Hyman and Abul Siddiqui

 Buddhist and Hindu-Jain Meditation Practice – Larissa Kitenko, Catherine Cripps, Swan, and Mark Beck

 Christian meditation practice – Mark Beck, Tom Corl and Mike Pullen.

The sessions averaged 10 participants. These sessions were well presented and much appreciated. These sessions offered instruction about and support for meditation practice. Participants indicated on evaluation forms and by word, that these sessions were very informative and valuable. The 4 Power Point presentations are available upon request from Mark Beck. If there is sufficient interest the 4-part series may be repeated in the future.

Silent Retreats

Katherine Johnson and Candace Shattuck continued to offer quarterly Inward Bound silent retreats at Third Haven. Quiet Days, called Inward Bound, provide the opportunity for weekday retreats away from the busy-ness of everyday life. These silent retreats are for listening for the Light within, reflection, reading, and enjoying the grounds of Third Haven. There is a silent shared potluck lunch and worship sharing to close the day. These were offered on 3.21, 6.20, 9.19 and 12.12. They plan to continue these in 2013.

Course in Miracles

The Course in Miracles is a self-study curriculum, consisting of the metaphysical framework, a workbook with 365 daily lessons for a 1-year study period, and a manual for teachers in question and answer format. The curriculum, gently teaches us how to change our mind and undo the misperceptions of the ego through forgiveness, and healing our perceptions of separation from God and from each other. Mike Pullen continued to lead the Course in Miracles, in weekly meetings most of the year with 4-5 regular participants. Mike introduced the course at the rise of meeting for worship on 3.18. The group finished the 31 chapters and after a break resumed, starting again at the beginning. This course will continue in 2013.

Sharing Spiritual Journeys

Mark Beck organized the presentations by Third Haven Friends, at the rise of meeting for worship, on their spiritual journeys or what it means to be a Quaker. In 2012, the presentations were – Lorraine B Claggett on 4.22, Ralph Young on 5.20 and Sam Mullen on 6.17. These were very well received. The Committee plans to continue these in 2013.

Other Activities

The Committee sponsored a Spiritual Formation reunion on 3.17, hosted by Mark Beck. The Spiritual Formation reunion offered an opportunity for participants to gather to review their spiritual journeys and to support one another in deepening and growing in the Light. This reunion brought closure to the year-long Spiritual Formation program offered in 2011. Some Spiritual Formation small groups continued to meet in 2012.

The Committee did not sponsor book discussions in 2012, due to the variety of other activities, but may resume book discussions in 2013.

The WMC considered offering another Spiritual Formation program and a more intensive course, like Quakerism 101. The WMC found brief programs offered over a few weeks at the rise of meeting for worship seem to attract more interest and participation. It seems that programs that are longer (60-120 minutes) and last for several weeks, attract sufficient commitment only every 3-4 years.

This process is executed with prayerful consideration of each individual's talents throughout the months of work. We began in September soliciting from each member and attender his or her past experience, desires for 2013 and any comments they chose to share by e-mail and in print. In October the committee canvased members and attenders from whom we had not heard or who might serve as clerks of committees for the coming year. The resulting Draft presents the November Meeting for Worship for the purpose of doing Business with proposed officers, liaisons and representatives and committee clerks and members for the 2013 calendar year. Final approval will occur at the December Meeting for Business. The Nominating Committee continues to function as needed throughout the year should vacancies occur. We thank all those willing to share their talents in the service of the meeting. Third Haven Friends Meeting Testimonies and Concerns 2012 Annual Report

Quaker concerns are deeply rooted, inherited truths of past generations. Testimonies are our witness to these truths as we, in community, perceive them to be in this present time. With the measure of the Light that is granted us, your committee has undertaken work in some, certainly not all that we would wish, witness to the needs in the world. This report takes the form of responses to queries posed in Faith and Practice. It is notable that this year our involvement in interfaith work and attention to worldwide connections have greatly increased, taking up a good portion of our activity.

How do we work to overcome social, legal, economic and political injustice in our community and the wider world?

Two Faith in Action programs with simple food presented conditions in Columbia by Aguayuda and undocumented workers in the United States by the Multicultural Center in Easton.

Clean water projects in Columbia have been: underwriting a water delivery truck to Cachaca II for the second year and supplying a family with a home water filter, the

Multicultural Center and local migrant worker camps receive volunteers and donations.

The Shoffner International Education Fund will make connections that sponsor needs in the wider world. We have collaborated with First Day School youth to develop areas of need around

the world where funds may be used. The youth have reported four organizations which they want to support.

Quaker meeting responses to the Occupy movement, including a letter from Wicomico Meeting, were discussed and circulated with a request that the meeting add its support. This was not approved in meeting for business.

How do we serve the community through action on concerns for civic improvement?

The meeting continues to be active in the following meeting and interfaith activities: Marilla's lunches, the Talbot Interfaith Shelter, food and clothing donations to the Neighborhood Service Center, lunches to Ridgeway House, a mission to the migrant workers in Caroline County, a lending library in the Talbot detention center, volunteers at the Multicultural Center after school program

How do we act to advance peace, to oppose violence, and to support the constructive use of authority in our community, nation and the world?

Our connection to P.E.A.C.E. has been reinvigorated. We have taken part in the yearly Multicultural Festival and the annual Christmas parade with messages of peace, and with presences at the weekly peace vigil at the Courthouse and the World Day of Peace recognition. We support Easton's mayor as a Mayor for Peace.

The Meeting makes token monetary donations to Quaker organizations and to a few local ones at the committee's recommendation. No recommendations for donations have come from the meeting during this part of the fiscal year. Last year the following were recommended by committee: AFSC, FCNL, Friends General Conference, Friends Journal, Pendle Hill, Quaker Earthcare Witness, Neighborhood Service Center, Good Samaritan Fund of TACL, PEACE, Talbot Interfaith Shelter, Migrant Ministry.

The Meeting established and the committee has oversight of the Shoffner International Education fund to promote peace in the world.

The HIPP (offshoot of AVP) program, which we hoped to establish at Easton High School, was not implemented and the funds not spent were used for the water truck for Aguayuda.

We support Friends Committee on National Legislation with two members attending the annual lobby day and advocacy at Senator Milkulski's and Representative Harris' offices.

Report on the Third Haven Legal Status and Insurance

Approved at the 12.9.12 meeting for business

Introduction

Over the last few months it seemed that some among the Meeting members and attenders, and the Meeting officers were not entirely clear on the legal status and incorporation of the Meeting, and the related insurance coverage for:

1. Property and grounds (property) owned and under the care of The Trustees of Third Haven Friends Monthly Meeting of the Society of Friends – the “Trustees”; and

2. Third Haven Friends Meeting – the “Meeting”, the monthly meeting in Philadelphia Yearly Meeting, PYM.

It is helpful to understand Third Haven as a general term of reference and description, and to recognize 2 different legal entities – 1) the Trustees and 2) the Meeting.

At the 11th month meeting for business, the Assistant Clerk raised a concern about his lack of clearness on these matters. He offered and was asked to look into these matters and report back to 12th month meeting for business.

Findings

1. Property – Since 5th month 6th, 1949, the Trustees have held the deed and title to the Third Haven property. Thus, the Third Haven property and grounds are owned by the Trustees, not the Meeting or PYM. The intention of this arrangement is to protect and preserve the Third Haven property and grounds in perpetuity, no matter what may happen to the Meeting or PYM.

2. Legal Status – The Trustees was legally incorporated, separately from the Meeting, on 12th month 7th, 1947. The Trustees corporation is governed by a self-perpetuating Board. At present, the Trustees invite the Meeting to nominate Trustees for vacancies that occur. The establishment of Third Haven Friends Meeting antedates the incorporation laws of the State of Maryland. The Meeting is now legally incorporated as a “subordinate” legal entity under PYM. The Meeting enjoys “tax exempt status,” as a 501 (c) (3) a not-for-profit, per an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) ruling.

- The “GEN number” is 9125.
- The “name of the organization” is Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends.
- The “EIN number” for Third Haven Friends Monthly Meeting is 52-0689918.

3. Insurance – The property and grounds, the Meeting and its activities are insured under a comprehensive insurance policy provided through PYM. The overall PYM insurance policy covers monthly meetings in PYM. The policy covers the Third Haven property, liability, the operations and activities of the Meeting, Meeting officers, First Day School and other aspects of the property and the Meeting. According to PYM, Trustees and an insurance advisor, this is an excellent insurance policy. The Trustees maintain the certificate of insurance for both the property and the Meeting. At least since 11th month 2003, the Trustees have paid the premiums on the PYM insurance for the property and the Meeting. PYM has the insurance reviewed annually by a qualified independent agent. The Trustees review the insurance policy independently from time to time. The point of contact for the insurance is Bob Register, Uninvest Insurance, 610-692-0223, register@uninvest.net . Cliessa Nagle, and Trustees Marsie Hawkinson, Allan Mielke and Bill Lane provided this information.

All these are in the good order used among Third Haven Friends, though perhaps not so widely and clearly understood among all of us at Third Haven Friends Meeting.

For better clearness on property, legal status and insurance matters, more widely shared in the Meeting community, the Assistant Clerk requests that this report be approved by and included in the minutes of the 12th month 2012 meeting for business. 
